

The December 12, 2006 meeting of the Newtown Village Council was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Mayor John Hammon, who led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

David Pepper: Hamilton (County Commission, January 1, 2007) I want to thank Councilman Evans for inviting me tonight. I simply wanted to come out and extend my greetings as I join the County Commission in January 2007. My goal is to work with you to make sure you have the best quality of life and the best safety in this great village. I hope to get rid of the bickering downtown; it doesn't get us anywhere. I want all county, the city and all of the other villages and cities to work together. The future of this county will be determined, not by what we do in between the two stadiums. We have to do something better than the parking lot, but by the quality of life of all the jurisdictions of Hamilton County. That's what I really want to work with you on and come out to just say hello. If we make every community a great place to live for families; a safe place to live by working with our great law enforcement officials by solving the jail issue and by working on traffic and safety issues. We at Hamilton County focus on those qualities of life concerns throughout the county so when families make the decision of where to live or businesses make their decision about where to locate. They find jurisdictions throughout Hamilton County as good choices and as much as focusing on all of those downtown issues. I will focus very hard and will want to work with you on your priorities. I know you have plans to do a lot of things around here and my goal is to work with you in partnership. I am good friends with David Krings and I think you were brilliant to bring him on. That's a very high priced guy who I don't think charged me a lot for the quality of services. He'll be a great help and I look forward to working with him as well. I do have another meeting; I just wanted to say hello and greet the citizens and council. I talked to your Lieutenant and obviously safety, I think Newtown is doing better than most places. As a county and I obviously saw this down in Cincinnati; if we do not improve the safety of the county as a whole, starting with the worst parts of Cincinnati, but also with other parts. All of the other things we hope to do will not be achieved. You'll see a real focus from the very moment I get to the County Commission a real focus on the law enforcement side, the intervention side and the incarceration side to make sure we do what we know we can do. The bottom line in the end is it can be done. Thank you for having me.

Paul Frede, Resident:

1. Center Island: I am curious when we are planning on breaking ground.

Mr. Pulskamp: I'm going to talk about that tonight.

Mr. Frede: (Continued)

2. Jake Brakes: These trucks coming down SR 32 towards UDF are annoying and they don't need them. I've talked to several people who agree they are a nuisance. I can even hear the rattling at night. I know New Richmond has a "no jake break" ordinance and just ask that you consider it.
3. Fire Hdydrant: It was brought to my attention that the fire hydrant in front of my shop on Round Bottom doesn't work. Is that true?

Ms. Everett: The one in front of the duct cleaning? That one was replaced.

Mr. Pulskamp: About six weeks ago, we replaced it. Two or three months ago it was not working.

Ms. Everett: They tried to fix it and it didn't get fixed so we had it replaced and now it is working.

Mr. Frede: Thank you; that is all I have.

Mayor John Hammon:

1. Ragland Road: Bruce is out of town and called me today. He has been talking with Water Works regarding Ragland Road. Weather permitting, they plan to walk it Thursday.
2. Traffic Lights: Traffic lights are going up and should be functioning middle of next week.
3. R.I.T.A.: R.I.T.A. has been working hard to get this right. Federal House and Senate in Washington has passed or amended a bill giving R.I.T.A. the rights to the income tax information to run against the records of people who are not reporting within the village.

Fiscal Officer Keri Everett:

1. Website: We've been working with Sue Veldkamp to update the website and change some things around. We want to add the zoning code and property maintenance code and various other items. In reviewing the website, we did notice that council bios need to be updated. We're working on a packet to give her so if you guys would update your bio and get it back to me.
2. Temporary Appropriations: You have the temporary appropriations in front of you. They are basically what we have this year and that's so we can spend money starting in January. You'll receive the final ones the first of February.

Lieutenant Synan:

1. Riffles: Just to let you know, our new riffles came in.
2. Driver Simulator Training: The training went well. Officer Vontz was certified on the training for free. He found that 40% of accidents in the U.S.A. involving police officers were actually the officer's fault. In Newtown, we had three accidents and 100% were our police officer's fault. We made sure our officers took the training serious and hoping we reduce the accidents by 100% next year.
3. Property Maintenance Report: Dick Weber wanted me to make sure you all received his report in your mailboxes. The report is very detailed on the progress he has made and where he is at with everything.

Councilmember Tracy Hueber:

1. Police Department Furniture: The new furniture did come in so I need to make a motion to surplus two desks and one couch of no value.

Ms. Hueber made a motion to surplus two desks and one couch at zero value. Mr. Pulskamp seconded the motion. All Aye. Motion Carried.

Mr. Cosby: What will we do with that?

Ms. Hueber: I'd say give Christian Faith down there to see if they could use it or know of anyone in need.

Ms. Hueber: The software maintenance support agreement for InterBadge, I also need to make a motion to pay the invoice. I need to put this on the checklist.

Ms. Hueber made a motion to approve an amount, \$2,851.15 to EmergiTech. Mr. Cosby seconded the motion. All Aye. Motion Carried.

Ms. Hueber: (continued)

2. Salary & Benefit Survey: Keri, I need for you to fill out this survey. It's a request from Fairfax. It's requesting, we're doing a pool of all the salaries and health plans and different things like that. If you could give that back to me.

Mayor Hammon: Who are we?

Ms. Hueber: The Village of Fairfax and Mariemont so that we all have it on file and we all keep it. So that all of us will know if we're all on range with the supporting neighborhoods. I think it will be good. What full-time workers and part-time workers, if they include uniforms; because then we're not making up our own. If I can have that back and then I'll pass it on.

3. Newsletter: The newsletter draft is ready so I'm going to send it out so it gets to the residents before December 22; which is the date of the hayride.

Councilmember Ken Pulskamp:

1. Church Parking Contract: We've had two readings for the church parking ordinance contract; so I'd like to make a motion to have the third reading of an ordinance uniting into contract with Newtown United Methodist Church for rental for the church parking lot.

Mr. Pulskamp made a motion to have a Third Reading of ORDINANCE 29-2006 AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND FISCAL OFFICER TO ENTER INTO A CONTRACT WITH NEWTOWN UNITED METHODIST CHURCH FOR RENTAL OF THE CHURCH PARKING LOT AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. Mr. Evans seconded the motion. Ms. Hueber-Yes, Mr. Pulskamp-Yes, Mr. Evans-Yes, Mr. Cosby-Yes. Motion Carried.

Mayor Hammon: Let the record that Mark Kobasuk has arrived at 7:50 p.m.

Mr. Pulskamp: (Continued)

2. River Hills Curb and Gutter Project: Last meeting we discussed beginning this project early spring 2007. We have a resolution for Brandstetter Carroll for their engineering; to design and bid specs for the project.

Mr. Pulskamp made a motion to suspend the rules. Mr. Cosby seconded the motion. All Aye. Motion Carried.

Mr. Pulskamp made a motion to adopt RESOLUTION 24-2006 A RESOLUTION APPROVING A CONTRACT WITH BRANDSTETTER CARROLL, INC. FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES, DISPENSING WITH THE SECOND AND THIRD READINGS AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. Ms. Hueber seconded the motion.

Discussion:

Mr. Kobasuk: Ken, are we going to work in Ivy Hills to this deal down the road? It's just not in here in now, but it is going to be?

Mr. Pulskamp: Ivy Hills Lane and the first phase of River Hills are included. Bruce thought it would be a cheaper project to tie it all together.

Mr. Cosby: Are they trying to bid this; why are we doing it by emergency?

Mr. Pulskamp: He wants to try and get bids back by February 1, 2007. We hope to start construction by March 1st.

Roll Call: Ms. Hueber-Yes, Mr. Pulskamp-Yes, Mr. Evans-Yes, Mr. Cosby-Yes, Mr. Kobasuk-Yes. Motion Carried.

Mr. Pulskamp: (Continued)

3. Temporary Appropriations: Since this is our last meeting, we need to be able to spend money as of January 1, 2007.

Mr. Pulskamp made a motion to suspend the rules. Ms. Hueber seconded the motion. All Aye. Motion Carried.

Mr. Pulskamp made a motion to adopt RESOLUTION 25-2006 A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE VILLAGE TEMPORARY APPROPRIATIONS FOR 2007 AND DISPENSING WITH THE SECOND AND THIRD READINGS AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY. Mr. Evans seconded the motion. Ms. Hueber-Yes, Mr. Pulskamp-Yes, Mr. Evans-Yes, Mr. Kobasuk-Yes, Mr. Cosby-Yes. Motion Carried.

Mr. Pulskamp: (Continued)

4. David Krings: John, if we want David Krings to do something, does that come from you or can that come from council?

Mayor Hammon: It really should probably come through me so we can monitor his time. I look at his time sheets so I would appreciate it if it comes through me so I know.

Mr. Pulskamp: I'd like to make a request that we have him totally review the proposed personnel practices. I know that is one of his areas of expertise. He has not worked on this project at all and I would like to see him review it, along with council.

Mr. Cosby: Would it not make more sense for us to review it first and make changes we feel we want to make and then let him look it over as a final review?

Mr. Pulskamp: I don't know of any of us sitting here at this council table are professional in the personnel practices, where he is. I think he could point out things that are proper and not proper that we don't know.

Ms. Hueber: And compare them to the other cities.

Mr. Cosby: I'm not saying he can't. I'm just saying, should we not first review them?

Ms. Hueber: I kind of see both points; but I think it's more beneficial to us if he looks at it first. He knows Lockland's and the City of Cincinnati's personnel practices. Therefore, he can bring a better comparison to us.

Mayor Hammon: Comparison to what?

Mr. Cosby: I just don't want to see him dwell on something that we may throw out or add. What if we discuss and add some things and he will have to go through it again.

Mr. Pulskamp: He would only have to review those changes we would like to see and make recommendations on those.

Mr. Cosby: Well, you're having him review a document that we haven't even had a chance to absorb and discuss amongst ourselves.

Mr. Pulskamp: I just don't anybody sitting here has the experience of personnel practices as that man does.

Mr. Evans: As long as he looks at it, if we go over it first and try to work it out.

Ms. Hueber: Yeah, as long as he can go over it.

Mr. Cosby: That makes a little more since then spending our time having him look at something that we haven't yet reviewed and then we're going to pay for him to look at them again. Let's put a document together to best of our ability and then let him make a review of that.

Mr. Kobasuk: John, do you think that's a good idea?

Mayor Hammon: It's got mixed emotions. You're paying Mr. Miller a lot of dollars to write it and he's a lawyer.

Mr. Kobasuk: He's written it though, right?

Mayor Hammon: Yeah, he's written it so far. He's gone back with the issues; we met about four hours last Monday reviewing the personnel practices.

Mr. Kobasuk: You mean you don't even want David Krings to look at it?

Mayor Hammon: He can look it; I'm just saying Doug's there.

Mr. Kobasuk: That's what I say.

Mayor Hammon: Curt's right, it's up to this council to decide how many holidays you want to give. What your vacation schedule. There are a lot of things in there that we could not sit down and answer that this council needs to come to the table for. I think we're probably one to months away from a final document. I don't know if you want to bring him in and pay him to go out and do a survey. They've already done that; they've already gone out and surveyed four to five communities and what they offer.

Mr. Kobasuk: Who's done that? Doug or has Keri done that?

Mayor Hammon: Keri has brought some of them in.

Mr. Evans: Do we need to have a working session to hammer it out?

Mayor Hammon: It probably will come down to that. Once we get through it and everyone has had a chance to review it. I thought maybe the second meeting in January might be the time to do it. David Krings doesn't have the insurance to protect him and Mr. Miller does so if there is something wrong and standards are violated, Mr. Miller will be responsible for that.

Ms. Hueber: Doug won't let anything happen; I mean he would tell us our legal responsibilities. David Krings just has a little bit more knowledge about them.

Mr. Cosby: What if we have a working session and include the department heads instead of just a council decision.

Ms. Hueber: I think so because I don't believe any of the employees were even considered in this.

Lieutenant Synan: I know council has the authority to pass it, but I read it and I read it and Keri did a tremendous job. There are a couple of areas of concern that I think are safety issues for the village, not only the employees that I'd like to bring up. I'm sure some of the employees would like to have some input. I know council doesn't have to do that, but if you're able and willing to we would appreciate that.

Mr. Cosby: I think that's a good idea. Good point.

Mr. Pulskamp: At some point, I'd just like for David Krings to review them.

Mr. Cosby: Let's see what we come up with first. John said we do have Doug who is going to review them anyway. It's going to be a bottom line to go through Doug Miller just to protect us, but I think you're putting the cart before the horse a little bit to have him look at a document that we haven't had a chance to digest.

Mr. Pulskamp: I took about two hours today and I reviewed it and compared it to our old one and we definitely need a working session.

Mr. Evans: When was the last time we did it Curt?

Mr. Pulskamp: 2001 was the last time that we passed a good one and we've added a couple of things to it since then.

Mayor Hammon: Bill Judd and I wrote the first personnel practices the village had.

Mr. Cosby: I know we did it back in the 1990's; I remember we had some big changes to the personnel practices, but we included a lot of personnel.

Ms. Hueber: I think that would be good; for one, Keri is an employee. She shouldn't be the only one working on it. It's not right.

Mayor Hammon: I'll take exception to that. I've put an amount of time in and other people have put their time in too. She's done some things and brought it together, but I will say it's not her.

Mr. Pulskamp: I wasn't making a motion or anything. I just wanted to put it out for discussion.

Ms. Everett: Do you want the employees to have a copy of it as well?

Mr. Evans: I think so; it's a lot easier to change it now than later.

Mr. Cosby: That's a good idea; absolutely.

Ms. Hueber: Tom and both Charlie, Charlie can give his input on it and Tom can and then council can put their input. Then it's a group and I think that's very fair.

Mr. Pulskamp: (continued)

5. Center Island: I'd like to make a motion to allow preliminary work to begin on the landscaping project.

Mr. Pulskamp made a motion to allow preliminary work to begin on the landscaping project for the center island, at no cost to the Village of Newtown. Mr. Kobasuk seconded the motion. All Aye. Motion Carried.

Mr. Pulskamp: (continued)

6. Crull Street Subdivision: John, did you have a chance to get the letter out to all of the residents in the Crull Street Subdivision notifying the parking is going to be effective?

Mayor Hammon: No I have not. I talked to Lt. Synan and long story short, we're not sure what it entails when you say "no parking." Whether it is the edge of blacktop, or edge of the right-of-way; so Doug and I have talked and we're going to get together again and look at what "no parking" really represents. I don't want to put a letter out until it is clear. People may lose their parking pads if it's in the right-of-way. We're trying to determine exactly what the impact of the law will be. The law will not be in effect on the 15th and won't be until I get the definition from Solicitor Miller on exactly where it stops.

Mr. Pulskamp: I spent about an hour and a half down there last week and spoke with a lot of residents. Charlie has went through and spotted where the white lines will be painted. I believe there are two or three parking spots that will be affected.

Mayor Hammon: There are only one or two people that will be impacted when we put the white lines down. All parking pads, if there is no parking in the right-of-way, everything will go away. We have to determine that before we put the letter out.

Mr. Kobasuk: John, what are you planning to do on painting white lines throughout the village? Is this something we're going to be doing up at Jefferson and Edith and all over where there are not curbs? What is your thinking on that?

Mayor Hammon: I think it should be wherever there are no curbs. It's a safety factor for people to visually see the edge of the road at nighttime. I think SR 32 has it. That's my opinion; if council says no we don't want white lines and we don't want to mark the edge of the road then you can make a motion. I think it's a safety factor for people.

Mr. Pulskamp: If you go up Jefferson and Edith at nighttime and street lights are out, if it's dark you don't know where the edge of the road is and you can go off the road and into a ditch. If you see that white line you'll know you're along the edge of the road.

Mr. Kobasuk: Have you talked to people about this? I'm just trying to not upset the residents again like we did with the Crull Street. I just don't want to upset a lot of people. Big white lines are not going to look so nice, in my view. According to you, Ken, you're not going to do it in Ivy Hills because we have curbs and gutters.

Mr. Pulskamp: Right.

Mr. Kobasuk: I'm thinking about the sleepy cul-de-sacs where they have nice trees and it's black asphalt and now you're going to have big white lines.

Mr. Evans: I know up in Ivy Hills we have black lines going every which way.

Mr. Kobasuk: You and I talked about that; it's not too attractive. I'm just trying to involve people so they don't get upset when they wake up one day and see Charlie painting white lines.

Mr. Pulskamp: I really believe it comes down to a safety issue again also. Sometimes people may not want something, but it's what is safe for all the residents of the village and not just certain people that live on that street. I believe we need to look at the village as whole and not just certain areas in the village.

Mr. Kobasuk: Why haven't we done this before, if it's a big safety issue?

Mr. Pulskamp: Some effects just started happening in the last couple of years.

Ms. Hueber: Change. Change happens.

Mr. Kobasuk: But these are sleepy cul-de-sacs that have been like that for decades and decades. There's no safety issues brought to our attention.

Mr. Cosby: I agree with Mark that before we go in there and start painting the lines. You claim there is a safety issue, but there's not one thing to back it up and there is not a ditch on Edith, Jefferson or Pine. I agree with Mark, if that's something that you intend to do or you think it's a safety issue, let's ask the residents if they feel it's a safety issue.

Ms. Hueber: How do you want to ask all of these people? Maybe I'm not as anal as some of the people, if somebody was painting stripes in the village, I would assume that the streets needed to be painted. That's why we have white lines all over the city.

Mr. Evans: Tracy, I probably agree with you, but also if we could mention in the newsletter that this is the route we might want to take. Put it in the Mayor's column real fast. If it's controversial, put it in John's

Ms. Hueber: I'll put it in there under "food for thought."

Mr. Kobasuk: We're trying to communicate with the residents and not just decide things in vacuum.

Councilmember Doug Evans:

- Checklist: Keri, the Ohio Police and Fire Pension Fund, on page 2, for \$17,000. That's for both the fire and the police?

Ms. Everett: No. We only have police here.

Mr. Evans: Why does it say "Fire?"

Ms. Everett: That's the name of the pension fund.

Mr. Evans: Doug Miller's bill for two months?

Mr. Miller: You get quarterly billing with a month on top of it.

Mr. Evans made a motion to approve Checklist dated 12/12/2006, with additions of Smith & Wesson \$247.00 and United Methodist Church \$6,000 and EmergiTech \$2851.15. All Aye. Motion Carried.

Councilmember Curt Cosby: There will be a Parks Committee meeting January 3, 2007 at 6:30 p.m.

Solicitor Miller:

- Income Tax Code:

Mr. Kobasuk: Doug was kind enough to send me a back-line copy and I had a question on the definition of income; did you get that email Doug?

Mr. Miller: No I did not.

Mr. Kobasuk: On page 2, regarding A, B and C; we define income and I take it that is a new definition, is that correct?

Mr. Miller: We had the original draft that I had done originally and then went to R.I.T.A. and they had some changes. The black-line changes that you see should be the changes from R.I.T.A., not the changes from our original code.

Mr. Kobasuk: Let me just ask my question, not so much the changes. In the definition of income, section A, we define income that is going to subject to the tax as all salaries, wages, commissions, other compensation and on the phrase that concerns me, "and other income from whatsoever source." Do you see that language?

Mr. Miller: Yes.

Mr. Kobasuk: And it's not modified by any working in Newtown. My concern is that is going to be ambiguous with the language where we have exclusion for interest and dividends from intangible property. No interest we might earn on savings is not subject to the Newtown tax.

Mr. Miller: No, because I think it's then taken back out in the section that says this is not income.

Mr. Kobasuk: So, you think there is no ambiguity then?

Mr. Miller: No. I don't see a problem. Because you have other sources that maybe income; in other words, what we exclude is what we exclude. This is what R.I.T.A. approved.

Mr. Kobasuk: Is that a change from the prior definition?

Mr. Miller: I don't think so. It may be a change from the definition that we now have in the tax code, but I don't think it's a change in the entire change. I don't recall it being a change from what R.I.T.A. said to change it to.

Mr. Kobasuk: So your legal opinion is that this tax code is not going to eliminate the exclusion for interest and dividends that are excluded from taxation.

Mr. Miller: What page are the exclusions on?

Mr. Kobasuk: There are no page numbers on mine. It's under "Exceptions, number 8." It says, "interest and dividends from intangible property." Are excluded. I just want it to be clear that your legal opinion is that is going to be excluded.

Mr. Miller: I see it. All of these exclusions are considered income, let's say under the internal revenue.

Mr. Kobasuk: Right, but they're excluded for Newtown income.

Mr. Miller: Right, and the other thing is the state law says they are excluded also.

Mr. Kobasuk: My concern when I received the black-line version there was a change to the definition of income.

Mr. Miller: I don't go by that black-line because R.I.T.A. suggested we make a change, but it was a very small change. That indicates the entire definition was black-lined, but I don't recall R.I.T.A.'s comment. It was only like adding in the words, it might have been R.I.T.A. said to add "any other income." I can't remember what it was, but it was a very small change in the definition.

Mr. Kobasuk: In the other subsection B and C, "any other income," is modified by "worked on or services performed in Newtown." But, "A" says "income means: salaries, wages, commissions, other compensations and other income from whatever source," which would seem to me that it would include.....

Mr. Miller: Well, but that's the definition of income. Okay, I see what you're saying. I don't see it as a problem. Interest and dividends are not taxed. They're not allowed to be taxed.

Mr. Kobasuk: I want it to continue that way; that's why I'm raising the question. But, your legal opinion is that interest and dividends are not going to be affected by this.

Mr. Miller: Even if we didn't have it in section F-8, we still couldn't tax them. State law says we can't tax them. There actually is a way that you could have taxed interest and dividends had you put that on a ballot about four or five years ago. The state allowed you to put it on the ballot. For instance, the City of Wyoming did and they are allowed to tax interest and dividends. Even if we didn't have it in there we wouldn't be allowed to tax.

Mr. Kobasuk: Okay. Thank you.

Mr. Miller: I don't know why that whole thing is black-lined because it wasn't that big of a change.

Mr. Kobasuk: It looks to me like there are no major changes in here.

Mr. Miller: Not from the last draft that you received. There are some major changes, not from a tax standpoint, but more from a procedural standpoint from your current tax code. But not in terms of the tax itself. For instance, returns are now due April 15th, not April 30th

Mr. Kobasuk: I guess we're not going to tax anybody under eighteen (18); that's a new change right?

Mr. Miller: No. That's been that way for a few years.

Mr. Pulskamp: That was about three (3) years ago.

Mayor Hammon: Mark, it was outside the code. An ordinance was passed amending the code so he probably brought it into the code so it's black-lined.

Mr. Kobasuk: Yeah, because any income of any individual under eighteen (18) years of age is black-lined.

Mr. Miller: That's because when R.I.T.A. went through the first draft I did, they knew we weren't taxing people under eighteen and I had forgotten to put that in here.

Mr. Kobasuk: Oh, some of these changes are.....okay.

Mr. Miller: The changes you're looking at are R.I.T.A.'s suggested changes from the first draft that you got. As I said today, when I sent them that they came back with two more things and those are not black-lined in there. One of which I didn't change. They were making a suggestion and this council can think about it. On section 10.0 D, section 2 A,B, and C; they were suggesting, this tax code basically came from the Southwest Ohio Tax Association, that all of the communities belong to and that is where I got this original draft that I made changes to. They were suggesting we just have one flat penalty. That's something if you want to look at in the future and if you want to do it, fine. I didn't know what you wanted to do and we need to vote tonight.

Mr. Kobasuk: What's your suggestion? What's in there, a graduated scale?

Mr. Miller: I would probably leave it alone. You know if somebody forgets and gets it in a month late, I don't think you ought to hammer them for that.

Mr. Kobasuk: Just for the record, as I read section 15.0 Doug, we're keeping in the credit for taxes paid elsewhere. That has not changed?

Mr. Miller: Yes. The other change R.I.T.A. had suggested was in Extensions, Section 5.0 E-3; the last sentence is new.

Ms. Hueber: I have a question that is not tax related. Does the Village of Newtown have a commercial working? It was brought up to me by a resident. Can commercial businesses come in and work on Sundays in the Village? I know some do that you can't work after such and such an hour, cutting trees, sawing wood, doing construction or anything on Sundays?

Mr. Miller: We have a noise ordinance. I'm not aware of anything like that.
